1 Kings 14:21-31 Rehoboam Reigns in Judah (2 Chron 11:5-12:16)

Influence of Solomon's improper marriages to foreign women damaged the kingdom of Judah ²¹ And Rehoboam the son of Solomon reigned in Judah. Rehoboam was forty-one years old when he became king. He reigned seventeen years in Jerusalem, the city which the Lord had chosen out of all the tribes of Israel, to put His name there. His mother's name was Naamah, an Ammonitess. ²² Now Judah did evil in the sight of the Lord, and they provoked Him to jealousy with their sins which they committed, more than all that their fathers had done. ²³ For they also built for themselves high places, sacred pillars, and wooden images on every high hill and under every green tree. ²⁴ And there were also perverted persons in the land. They did according to all the abominations of the nations which the Lord had cast out before the children of Israel.

Adversity from Egypt

²⁵ It happened in the fifth year of King Rehoboam that Shishak king of Egypt came up against Jerusalem. ²⁶ And he took away the treasures of the house of the Lord and the treasures of the king's house; he took away everything. He also took away all the gold shields which Solomon had made. ²⁷ Then King Rehoboam made bronze shields in their place, and committed them to the hands of the captains of the guard, who guarded the doorway of the king's house. ²⁸ And whenever the king entered the house of the Lord, the guards carried them, then brought them back into the guardroom.

They did according to all the abominations of the nations which the Lord had cast out before the children of Israel. [1 Kings 14:21-24]

- ♦ It is easy to see why God took the northern tribes away from the descendants of Solomon, because they were influenced by their pagan mothers and refused to cling to the God of Israel, even though Solomon had made the conclusion in writing that the whole duty of man is to fear and obey the God of Israel. [Ecclesiastes 12:13-14]
- ♦ Rehoboam son of Solomon reigned 17 years in Jerusalem.
- ☆ Jerusalem is the town the Lord had chosen out of all the tribes of Israel to represent God to the world by allowing the Temple of Yahweh to be built within its walls.

- ☆ Influenced by Solomon's weakness and his Ammonite mother, Rehoboam led Judah to do evil in the sight of the Lord.
- They built for themselves high places, sacred pillars, and wooden images on every high hill and under every green tree. [1 Kings 14:23]
- ♦ There were also perverted persons (Sodomites, homosexuals) in the land.
- ♦ They practiced all the sexual perversions God condemned that had been done by the nations God destroyed before Israel. [Leviticus 18:1-30]

Adversity from Egypt

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27 Then King Rehoboam made bronze shields in their place, and committed them to the hands of the captains of the guard, who guarded the doorway of the king's house. 28 And whenever the king entered the house of the Lord, the guards carried them, then brought them back into the guardroom. [1 Kings 14:25-28]

- ♦ When the kingdom of Judah fell into sin, God took away all the great wealth He had allowed to flow to Solomon and it was carried away to Egypt.
- ☆ Rehoboam attempted to retain the appearance of wealth by replacing the gold shields with shields made of bronze, because of the similar appearance though vastly inferior material.
- \diamond Rehoboam was all for show, not for substance.
- \diamond Many people today try to appear godly, but it is all pretense.

End of Rehoboam

- ☆ 29 Now the rest of the acts of Rehoboam, and all that he did, are they not written in the book of the chronicles of the kings of Judah?
 - 30 And there was war between Rehoboam and Jeroboam all their days.

³¹ So Rehoboam rested with his fathers, and was buried with his fathers in the City of David. His mother's name was Naamah, an Ammonitess. Then Abijam his son reigned in his place. [1 Kings 14:29-31, 2 Chron 11:5-12:16]

- ♦ Rehoboam's turn from the Lord brought the invasion from Egypt. [2 Chronicles 12:14]
- ♦ Rehoboam and the leaders of Judah humbled themselves so they were not destroyed altogether but God gave them some deliverance. [2 Chron 12:1-9]
- ♦ There were wars between Rehoboam (Judah) and Jeroboam (Israel) all their days.
