Jeremiah 52:1-34 Reviewing the fall of Jerusalem – Jehoiachin's Release

The Fall of Jerusalem Reviewed (2 Kings 24:18-25:26; 2 Chronicles 36:11-20; Jeremiah 39:1-10)

- 1 Zedekiah was twenty-one years old when he became king, and he reigned eleven years in Jerusalem. His mother's name was Hamutal the daughter of Jeremiah of Libnah.
- ² He also did evil in the sight of the Lord, according to all that Jehoiakim had done.
- ³ For because of the anger of the Lord this happened in Jerusalem and Judah, till He finally cast them out from His presence. Then Zedekiah rebelled against the king of Babylon.
- ⁴ Now it came to pass in the ninth year of his reign, in the tenth month, on the tenth day of the month, that Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon and all his army came against Jerusalem and encamped against it; and they built a siege wall against it all around.
- ⁵ So the city was besieged until the eleventh year of King Zedekiah.
- ⁶ By the fourth month, on the ninth day of the month, the famine had become so severe in the city that there was no food for the people of the land.
- ⁷ Then the city wall was broken through, and all the men of war fled and went out of the city at night by way of the gate between the two walls, which was by the king's garden, even though the Chaldeans were near the city all around. And they went by way of the plain.
- 8 But the army of the Chaldeans pursued the king, and they overtook Zedekiah in the plains of Jericho. All his army was scattered from him.
- 9 So they took the king and brought him up to the king of Babylon at Riblah in the land of Hamath, and he pronounced judgment on him.
- 10 Then the king of Babylon killed the sons of Zedekiah before his eyes. And he killed all the princes of Judah in Riblah.
- He also put out the eyes of Zedekiah; and the king of Babylon bound him in bronze fetters, took him to Babylon, and put him in prison till the day of his death.

The Temple and City Plundered and Burned

- 12 Now in the fifth month, on the tenth day of the month (which was the nineteenth year of King Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon), Nebuzaradan, the captain of the guard, who served the king of Babylon, came to Jerusalem.
- 13 He burned the house of the Lord and the king's house; all the houses of Jerusalem, that is, all the houses of the great, he burned with fire.
- 14 And all the army of the Chaldeans who were with the captain of the guard broke down all the walls of Jerusalem all around.
- 15 Then Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard carried away captive some of the poor people, the rest of the people who remained in the city, the defectors who had deserted to the king of Babylon, and the rest of the craftsmen.
- 16 But Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard left some of the poor of the land as vinedressers and farmers.
- 17 The bronze pillars that were in the house of the Lord, and the carts and the bronze Sea that were in the house of the Lord, the Chaldeans broke in pieces, and carried all their bronze to Babylon.
- 18 They also took away the pots, the shovels, the trimmers, the bowls, the spoons, and all the bronze

utensils with which the priests ministered.

- 19 The basins, the firepans, the bowls, the pots, the lampstands, the spoons, and the cups, whatever was solid gold and whatever was solid silver, the captain of the guard took away.
- 20 The two pillars, one Sea, the twelve bronze bulls which were under it, and the carts, which King Solomon had made for the house of the Lord the bronze of all these articles was beyond measure.
- Now concerning the pillars: the height of one pillar was eighteen cubits, a measuring line of twelve cubits could measure its circumference, and its thickness was four fingers; it was hollow.
- 22 A capital of bronze was on it; and the height of one capital was five cubits, with a network and pomegranates all around the capital, all of bronze. The second pillar, with pomegranates was the same.
- 23 There were ninety-six pomegranates on the sides; all the pomegranates, all around on the network, were one hundred.

The People Taken Captive to Babylonia

- ²⁴ The captain of the guard took Seraiah the chief priest, Zephaniah the second priest, and the three doorkeepers.
- 25 He also took out of the city an officer who had charge of the men of war, seven men of the king's close associates who were found in the city, the principal scribe of the army who mustered the people of the land, and sixty men of the people of the land who were found in the midst of the city.

 26 And Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard took these and brought them to the king of Babylon at Piblah
- 27 Then the king of Babylon struck them and put them to death at Riblah in the land of Hamath. Thus Judah was carried away captive from its own land.
- 28 These are the people whom Nebuchadnezzar carried away captive: in the seventh year, three thousand and twenty-three Jews;
- 29 in the eighteenth year of Nebuchadnezzar he carried away captive from Jerusalem eight hundred and thirty-two persons;
- 30 in the twenty-third year of Nebuchadnezzar, Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard carried away captive of the Jews seven hundred and forty-five persons. All the persons were four thousand six hundred.

Jehoiachin Released from Prison (2 Kings 25:27-30)

- 31 Now it came to pass in the thirty-seventh year of the captivity of Jehoiachin king of Judah, in the twelfth month, on the twenty-fifth day of the month, that Evil-Merodach king of Babylon, in the first year of his reign, lifted up the head of Jehoiachin king of Judah and brought him out of prison.
- 32 And he spoke kindly to him and gave him a more prominent seat than those of the kings who were with him in Babylon.
- 33 So Jehoiachin changed from his prison garments, and he ate bread regularly before the king all the days of his life.
- 34 And as for his provisions, there was a regular ration given him by the king of Babylon, a portion for each day until the day of his death, all the days of his life.

Facts Revealed:

 - ♦ Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon had appointed Zedekiah as king of Judah. [2 Kings 24:17-20]
 - ❖ Zedekiah did evil in the sight of Yahweh just like Jehoiakim had done.
 - ♦ Because of the anger of Yahweh He brought Judah down until He finally cast them out of His sight and from His land.
 - ♦ Zedekiah rebelled against the king of Babylon.
- Now it came to pass in the ninth year of his reign, in the tenth month, on the tenth day of the month, that Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon and all his army came against Jerusalem and encamped against it; and they built a siege wall against it all around.
 - So the city was besieged until the eleventh year of King Zedekiah. [Jeremiah 52:4-5]
 - ♦ Jerusalem was besieged from the ninth to the eleventh year of the reign of Zedekiah.
- ⇒ By the fourth month, on the ninth day of the month, the famine had become so severe in the city that there was no food for the people of the land.
 - Then the city wall was broken through, and all the men of war fled and went out of the city at night by way of the gate between the two walls, which was by the king's garden, even though the Chaldeans were near the city all around. And they went by way of the plain.
 - But the army of the Chaldeans pursued the king, and they overtook Zedekiah in the plains of Jericho. All his army was scattered from him. [Jeremiah 52:6-8]
 - ♦ The fourth month of the eleventh year of his reign Zedekiah and all his men of war fled from Jerusalem through the king's garden through the gate between the walls by way of the plains of Jericho.
 - ♦ The Chaldeans overtook them in the plains of Jericho and Zedekiah's army was scattered from him.
- So they took the king and brought him up to the king of Babylon at Riblah in the land of Hamath, and he pronounced judgment on him.
 - Then the king of Babylon killed the sons of Zedekiah before his eyes. And he killed all the princes of Judah in Riblah.
 - He also put out the eyes of Zedekiah; and the king of Babylon bound him in bronze fetters, took him to Babylon, and put him in prison till the day of his death. [Jeremiah 52:9-11]

 - ♦ The king of Babylon killed Zedekiah's sons and the princes of Judah before his eyes then put out the eyes of Zedekiah, bound him in bronze fetters and carried him to Babylon where he died in prison.

The Temple and City Plundered and Burned

- Now in the fifth month, on the tenth day of the month (which was the nineteenth year of King Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon), Nebuzaradan, the captain of the guard, who served the king of Babylon, came to Jerusalem.
 - He burned the house of Yahweh (the Lord) and the king's house; all the houses of Jerusalem, that is, all the houses of the great, he burned with fire.
 - And all the army of the Chaldeans who were with the captain of the guard broke down all the walls of Jerusalem all around.

Then Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard carried away captive some of the poor people, the rest of the people who remained in the city, the defectors who had deserted to the king of Babylon, and the rest of the craftsmen.

But Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard left some of the poor of the land as vinedressers and farmers.

The bronze pillars that were in Beit Yahweh (the house of the Lord), and the carts and the bronze Sea that were in the house of the Lord, the Chaldeans broke in pieces, and carried all their bronze to Babylon.

They also took away the pots, the shovels, the trimmers, the bowls, the spoons, and all the bronze utensils with which the priests ministered.

The basins, the firepans, the bowls, the pots, the lampstands, the spoons, and the cups, whatever was solid gold and whatever was solid silver, the captain of the guard took away. The two pillars, one Sea, the twelve bronze bulls which were under it, and the carts, which King Solomon had made for Beit Yahweh (the house of the Lord) — the bronze of all these articles was beyond measure.

Now concerning the pillars: the height of one pillar was eighteen cubits, a measuring line of twelve cubits could measure its circumference, and its thickness was four fingers; it was hollow

A capital of bronze was on it; and the height of one capital was five cubits, with a network and pomegranates all around the capital, all of bronze. The second pillar, with pomegranates was the same.

There were ninety-six pomegranates on the sides; all the pomegranates, all around on the network, were one hundred. [Jeremiah 52:12-23]

- → The 19th year of Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon, Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard came with all the army of the Chaldeans to Jerusalem and burned Beit Yahweh, the king's house, and all the great houses of Jerusalem with fire and broke down the walls of Jerusalem.
- ♦ Then he carried away all but the poorest of the people whom he left as farmers and vinedressers.
- ♦ He took all the remaining treasures of Jerusalem and Beit Yahweh including all the gold, silver, and bronze articles of the temple.

The People Taken Captive to Babylonia and those slain at Riblah

☼ The captain of the guard took Seraiah the chief priest, Zephaniah the second priest, and the three doorkeepers.

He also took out of the city an officer who had charge of the men of war, seven men of the king's close associates who were found in the city, the principal scribe of the army who mustered the people of the land, and sixty men of the people of the land who were found in the midst of the city.

And Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard took these and brought them to the king of Babylon at Riblah.

Then the king of Babylon struck them and put them to death at Riblah in the land of Hamath. Thus Judah was carried away captive from its own land. [Jeremiah 52:24-27]

- ♦ The priests and officers of the Temple and of the city were taken to Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon at Riblah where they were put to death.
- ★ These are the people whom Nebuchadnezzar carried away captive: in the seventh year, three thousand and twenty-three Jews;

in the eighteenth year of Nebuchadnezzar he carried away captive from Jerusalem eight hundred and thirty-two persons;

in the twenty-third year of Nebuchadnezzar, Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard carried away captive of the Jews seven hundred and forty-five persons. All the persons were four thousand six hundred. [Jeremiah 52:28-30]

♦ Nebuzaradan carried captive to Babylon 3,023 people the seventh year, 832 people the 18th year, and 745 people the 23rd year of Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon for a total of 4,600 people.

Jehoiachin Released from Prison (2 Kings 25:27-30)

Now it came to pass in the thirty-seventh year of the captivity of Jehoiachin king of Judah, in the twelfth month, on the twenty-fifth day of the month, that Evil-Merodach king of Babylon, in the first year of his reign, lifted up the head of Jehoiachin king of Judah and brought him out of prison.

And he spoke kindly to him and gave him a more prominent seat than those of the kings who were with him in Babylon.

So Jehoiachin changed from his prison garments, and he ate bread regularly before the king all the days of his life.

And as for his provisions, there was a regular ration given him by the king of Babylon, a portion for each day until the day of his death, all the days of his life. [Jeremiah 52:31-34]

- → Evil-Merodach became king of Babylon on the 37th year of the captivity of Jehoiachin king of Judah.
- → He then brought Jehoiachin out of prison and gave him a prominent seat above the other kings in captivity.
- ❖ Jehoiachin changed out of his prison garments and ate regularly before the king of Babylon who provided for him the rest of his life.
